• Celebrating expanded transportation options for older adults - Older adults are Douglas County's fastest-



growing population, and your feedback is helping Douglas County provide the resources you need to age well – including reliable transportation. Recently, Aging Resources of Douglas County celebrated its partnership with Douglas County, AdventHealth, the Douglas County Housing Partnership and Meadowmark to introduce a free shuttle service for residents of Meadowmark, Oakwood and Reyn Rock Senior Housing in Castle Rock.

• 2025 Youth Congress - The 2025 Youth Congress was held on September 29 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the




Douglas County School District's Legacy Campus in Lone Tree. Youth Congress convenes high school students (grades 9–12) from across Douglas County to engage with civic leaders on topics that matter to them. It's designed to give youth a voice in community issues, to propose solutions, and to foster dialogue between students and elected or community leaders. Participants hear from adult leaders, discuss problems,

brainstorm actionable strategies, and share ideas with the larger group. Students who attend receive six hours of community service credit and an excused absence from school for the day. Categories discussed this year:

- Social and emotional wellness
- Peer pressure and youth voice
- School climate and restorative practices
- Prevention efforts (e.g. vaping)
- Access to mental health support
- Cell phone policy for public schools
- School facilities
- School transitions

Youth Congress is a key vehicle for amplifying young voices in Douglas County's policy and planning conversations. It helps bridge the gap between youth concerns and decision-makers, encouraging civic engagement and accountability. The event also strengthens the visibility of youth perspectives in local governance and community programming.

Community Outreach:

Vintage & Vibrant 2025 – The Seniors' Council of Douglas County held its Vintage & Vibrant event at the
Highlands Ranch Senior Center on September 17 to a sold-out crowd of older adults, caregivers, and
community members. The day-long event featured engaging keynote speakers and a wide range of





breakout sessions on topics such as nanobiotechnology, caregiving costs, legal planning, scam awareness, cognitive health, and artificial intelligence. There were also interactive experiences like dementia simulation and outdoor trishaw rides. Participants praised the diversity of topics, speakers, the opportunity to connect with others, and the fabulous food.

- Medicare Open Enrollment for 2026 On October 2, the Seniors' Council of Douglas County held its
 monthly meeting focused on Medicare Open Enrollment for 2026. The meeting provided valuable
 information on using Medicare's Plan Finder and understanding coverage options and upcoming changes,
 helping them make informed decisions for the year ahead. Approximately 18 people attended this meeting.
- Castle Rock Police Department Rally of Hope HEART participated in the Castle Rock Police
 Department's Rally of Hope event on September
 17. The event convened community providers to
 promote awareness of mental health and suicide
 prevention among residents.





- Homeless Initiative On September 30 and October 1, staff attended the 2025 Colorado Statewide Forum on Building Resilient Homelessness Prevention and Response Systems in Denver. The event was organized by the Colorado Division of Housing, in partnership with Community Solutions and Colorado's four Continuums of Care (COCs): the Balance of State, Metro Denver, Northern Colorado, and Pikes Peak. The Forum focused on sharing lessons and practices from across regions in Colorado, building peer networks and collaboration, and strengthening system-level strategies to prevent and solve homelessness.
- Arapahoe Community College (ACC) STURM Campus Resource Fair HEART participated in the ACC Sturm Campus Resource Fair on
 September 17. The event helped connect students and families with
 information and resources surrounding homelessness, financial aid,
 food assistance, and other vital resources. There were approximately
 45 students who attended the resource fair.



- Lone Tree First Responder Fun Fest HEART participated in the Lone Tree First Responder Fun Fest on September 20. The event brought together community and public safety partners to showcase services that are available throughout Douglas County.
- Lone Tree Police Department Citizen Police Academy On September 18, HEART presented at the Lone Tree Police Department's Citizen Police Academy. Information was shared with 20 community members about Douglas County's efforts to address homelessness and highlighted the Handout's Don't Help Campaign, which works to reduce panhandling through community awareness and engagement. Lone Tree Police Officer Kris Larson sent the following e-mail expressing gratitude for HEART.



• Highlands Ranch Older Adult Health Resource Expo – Community Services staff participated in the Highlands Ranch Older Adult Health Resource Expo on September 27 at the Highlands Ranch Senior Center. The event connected adults 55 and over and their care partners with local resources, offering information on health, wellness, and support services available in the community. Staff shared information about the Link regional rideshare program and transportation and senior services available through Douglas County partner organizations.



Parker Community Resource Fair for Older Adults — Community Services staff participated in the Parker Community Resource Fair for older adults on October 2 at the Parker Fieldhouse. The Resource Fair brings together a wide variety of organizations and agencies dedicated to supporting health, wellness, and overall quality of life for older adults in the community. Staff provided resources and information and engaged with around 52 participants to bring awareness to the many services and programs available to Douglas County older adults.



- Sonar Technology on Rueter-Hess Recreation Patrol Boat A new advanced sonar system has been installed on the patrol boat at Rueter-Hess Reservoir to enhance public safety, support recreational activities, and improve angling experiences. This sonar unit provides real-time underwater imaging and environmental data, enabling Park Rangers to:
 - Support Anglers by identifying active fish habitats and sharing that information to improve fishing success.
 - Enhance Visitor Safety by detecting underwater hazards and monitoring fluctuating water levels to ensure dock accessibility.
 - Assist Watercraft users by providing up-to-date water temperature readings and conditions for safer recreation.



In addition to recreational benefits, the sonar system significantly strengthens emergency response capabilities. It allows Park Rangers and first responders to quickly locate missing persons or submerged objects, dramatically improving search and rescue response times. This investment in technology reflects a continued commitment to public safety, environmental stewardship, and high-quality visitor experiences

at Rueter-Hess Reservoir.



9/11 Stair Climb Honoring Heroes - On Thursday, September 11, Lone Tree Brewing Company hosted a 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb at Rueter-Hess Incline. This stair climb consisted of traversing the incline 11 times in honor of the first responders that scaled the world trade center Twin Towers. The event honored both first responders and fallen heroes while supporting the Colorado State Fire Fighters Foundation. The event inspired other regular Incline visitors to attempt additional trips up the stairs that day. One local fire fighter conquered the incline in his bunker gear (firefighting uniform). Lone Tree Brewing Company is

interested in holding this as an annual event at Rueter-Hess.

• **Bike Park Renovations** - The bike park at Bayou Gulch Regional Park has seen an increase in usage in recent years. Parks staff has been dedicating time to rebuild areas throughout the bike park to make the experience safer and more enjoyable for the users of this unique property.

Paving the Way at Rueter-Hess - Visitors to Rueter-Hess Reservoir will now enjoy a smoother, more



welcoming arrival thanks to recent upgrades along the entrance roadway. These improvements mark a significant milestone in ongoing efforts to enhance access, safety, and the visitor experience. The project included significant updates to drainage and paving, the addition of new employee parking, and the seeding of native wildflowers along the entrance corridor. Together, these features create a more attractive and environmentally friendly gateway to the reservoir while ensuring safe and efficient access for

all visitors. This successful effort was made possible through the collaboration of several key partners: the

Department of Public Works Engineering Special Projects Team, Road and Bridge, Parker Water and Sanitation District, and the Rueter-Hess Recreation Advisory Board. Their combined expertise and commitment to public service made these improvements both efficient and sustainable.

The upgrades now provide easier vehicle entry, a level and durable surface for watercraft inspections, and a foundation that will support long-term recreational use as the reservoir continues to grow as a year-round destination. With these improvements complete, guests can look forward to a more updated experience at Rueter-Hess Reservoir.



• Sandstone Ranch Festival - The Historic Preservation team hosted a booth at the County's Fall Festival held at Sandstone Ranch on September 22. The booth included a variety of artifacts found at the ranch like Native American projectile points and pieces of barbed wire fence used at the historic ranches. The event was well attended and provided an excellent opportunity for staff, HPB members, and Repository volunteers to educate and engage with the public.



Public Outreach

Ponderosa Hills Civis Association Meeting - On October 5, staff presented information on Accessory
Dwelling Unit (ADU) regulations and answered questions on ADUs from the residents of Ponderosa Hills.







Assistance staff attended at career fairs hosted by Douglas County Public Schools. Several businesses and organizations set up booths showcasing current and future job opportunities for the students. Staff engaged with students about careers in various fields represented by our Department,

including Parks seasonal employment and volunteer opportunities. Attending the career fair provided a valuable opportunity to connect with a diverse pool of potential candidates and build meaningful connections within the community.

- On September 22, the Parks team hosted an informational table at the Fall Festival at Sandstone Ranch. Staff were able to talk to attendees about parks, trails, Ruter-Hess Reservoir, and project funding.
- On September 23, the Parks Program Coordinator attended the Douglas County School District Community Resource Fair. He was able to talk to participants about the volunteer program. The event was attended by over 100 residents.



Open Space and Natural Resources

30th Anniversary of Open Space Fall Festival - The Department Open Space and Natural Resources (OSNR)



was created in 1995. Since then, the department has preserved over 65,000 acres of land across Douglas County. This year, OSNR celebrated its 30th anniversary. To commemorate this milestone, the team hosted 30 public events across Open Space properties ranging from guided moonlight hikes, Coffee with a Ranger, and sunset yoga. The 30th anniversary celebrations concluded with a Fall Festival on September 22nd on the guided side of Sandstone Ranch.

Over 1,000 people attended the event, many being families with children. There were a variety of fall-themed activities for participants to enjoy, including pumpkin and face painting, archery, live music by a local artist, food trucks, cornhole, and wagon rides. There was a self-guided hike up to the ranch overlook, volunteer-led hikes, and a wildlife scavenger hunt where animal mounts were hidden along the trail for kids to find. The Office of Emergency Management was there for the entire day with the helicopter and educated attendees about rapid wildfire response. The event was a monumental success and the OSNR team have already started planning the celebrations for September 2026.







Elk Bugling at Cherokee Ranch and Castle - Cherokee Ranch and Castle is over 100 years old and sits on



3,500 acres of protected land. The land is protected through a conservation easement held by Douglas County. One of the most unique events hosted there is the Elk Bugling. The elk mating season, or rut, occurs in the fall and is characterized by male (bull) elk bugling to attract females (cows). Bugling can be described as a high pitched, echoing call with a loud, piercing cry lasting several seconds.

The Elk Bugling events occur every Tuesday and Thursday night from the middle of September through the beginning of October and a total of 270 people attended this year! OSNR staff set up a skins and skulls table, present visitors with the history of elk in Colorado, explain the background and importance of the conservation easement, and discuss some of the species' unique adaptations before heading outside to experience the sights and sounds of the rut. OSNR staff have led the education portion of the Elk Bugling for the last ten years and maintain a strong partnership with Cherokee Ranch.

Public Works

Active Projects (Cone Zone Webpage)

• County Line Road Widening and Reconstruction - Construction on County Line Road began in September



2025. On Monday, Oct. 6, 2025, traffic was shifted on County Line Road between University Boulevard and Clarkson Street. With this traffic shift, westbound traffic shifted to the south, and eastbound traffic remains shifted to the south. Be aware of crews working on the north side of County Line Road, as well as trucks and construction equipment in the project vicinity. This lane shift is scheduled to be in place until approximately August 2026. Beginning in late December 2025, motorists should anticipate a full closure of County Line Road from

Clarkson Street to the U-Haul business access area. The closure will last approximately 100 days, giving crews time to import dirt for construction at Lee Gulch.

Since 2019, Douglas County has worked with partners to advance the final design, acquire right-of-way, and prepare utility relocation design for a major water line located within the project area. Douglas County is partnering with the Denver Regional Council of Governments, the City of Littleton, and the City of Centennial to fund the project.

West Frontage Road Relocation (aka Dawson Trails Blvd.) - The West Frontage Road Relocation (Dawson Trails Boulevard) is part of a series of projects aimed at improving access and safety at the southern end of Castle Rock. Construction started on Sept. 9, 2024 and is now completed.



Hess Road Wildlife Crossing Bridge - This Project rehabilitates portions of the existing bridge that carries



Hess Road over a Wildlife crossing. The Hess Road over Wildlife Crossing Project started on September 2, 2025. The project's duration will be approximately 60 days. Contractor anticipates switching traffic on September 22, 2025, from the existing Hess Road Bridge east side work zone to the west side. Two-direction traffic with timed one-way temporary traffic signals will continue. Flaggers will be used as needed during the traffic switch and other major construction operations.

• I-25 Douglas County Monument Signs – Cushing Terrell provided final concept design renderings and cost estimates. They will now begin producing construction plans. County staff has identified an engineering contract within RTD and the consultant will now reach out to begin coordination on the overpass signage. County staff also received feedback from CDOT on the location of the southern signage and the consultant will now move forward with the design of a sign north of exit 163. Next steps include applying for CDOT approval of the sites.

• <u>Highlands Ranch Drainage Projects</u> - The Highlands Ranch Small Storm Sewer UV-CIPP Lining projects



started - Pipe repairs have already been completed located on Plaza Drive (Broadway & Ridgeline) and on Broadway (south of Northridge Recreation Center driveway). Starting in mid-August to early September of 2025, the next phase of storm sewer maintenance on Sterling Ct, Sterling Dr, Heatherwood Ct, Broadway just south of the Northridge Rec Center Access point, and at 9261 S Broadway, will occur. These projects are anticipated to be completed on December 31, 2025, weather dependent.

• Pine Creek and Highway 67 Culvert Replacement Project - Two culverts on Pine Creek Rd and three culverts on Douglas County Highway 67 need to be replaced. The existing storm culverts vary in size from 36" diameter to 48" diameter and are made of metal. We are anticipating that this work will occur Fall 2025 – Spring 2026. These culvert replacements will have roadway impacts and travelers to the area should expect long delays.



- Highlands Ranch Pkwy Reconstruction, Broadway to Burntwood Olsson continues to work on the design
 for the reconstruction of Highlands Ranch Parkway between Broadway and Burntwood. The geotechnical
 report is being finalized, and we anticipate receiving it on October 10th. The 30% design is also expected
 on October 10th. A design review is scheduled with Olsson and County staff on October 23rd.
- Kendrick Castillo Way / Plum Valley Lane Intersection Signal Project This project consists of installing a
 new traffic signal and making upgrades to meet current ADA requirements at the intersection of Kendrick
 Castillo Way and Plum Valley Lane. Traffic signal and roadway construction started on May 5, 2025, and is
 anticipated to be completed in mid-November 2025.
- Hilltop Road (Legend High School to Crest View Drive) Improvements Project For segment 1 of this



project, the construction began on April 16, 2025, and the contractor began implementing public notifications on message boards. This is the first of three projects planned over the next few years to reconstruct and widen the Hilltop Road and Singing Hills Road corridors. The project has a 16-month completion date and is anticipated to be finished by September 2026. Phase 2 of Construction is anticipated to begin in 2027; and will take 9 to 12 months to construct. Phase 3 of construction is anticipated to

begin in 2029 (pending funding); and will take 12 to 18 months to construct.

There have been questions from citizens about the new roundabout construction at the intersection of Crestview Dr and Village Rd on Hilltop Rd, which will eliminate the existing two-way stop-controlled intersection. Here is the map: Roundabout Rendition/Map.

 Quebec and Lincoln Turn Lane (Post Office Corner) - Muller Engineering, the designer of the intersection reconstruction project, has provided updated concept designs incorporating County staff feedback. Staff is evaluating cost versus benefit before moving forward with the project.



• Grigs Road Paving Project – Phase 2 - RS&H was selected as the design consultant for phase 2 of the Grigs Road project. Phase 2 will start where phase 1 ends, near the East-West



Road project. Phase 2 will start where phase 1 ends, near the East-West Trailhead Parking Lot and will continue north onto the existing concrete road. The project includes realignment of the road, drainage improvements, a parallel pedestrian trail, and asphalt paving. A kick-off meeting was held on September 15th with the consultants, County staff, Highlands Ranch Metro District staff and Highlands Ranch Community Association staff. The consultant will now begin survey work.

• Quebec and Park Meadows Drive Intersection Improvements — Basis Partners continues work on the design for improvements along the corridor. The final traffic study report is expected on October 20th. The consultant continues to finalize the design layouts and cost estimates. Final concept design submittal, including cost estimates, is scheduled to be submitted by mid-November.

C-470 Trail and University Blvd Pedestrian Grade Separation Project - Douglas County and CDOT are



partnering on advancing the construction of a new bridge to improve pedestrian and cyclist safety by eliminating the need for users of the C-470 Trail to cross University Blvd at-grade. This currently requires four separate roadway crossings, across a total of eight lanes of traffic. The proposed grade separated C-470 Trail crossing will also improve traffic operations, since the numerous bicyclists and pedestrians currently crossing at-grade, adversely impact signal progression along University

Blvd and traffic entering or existing the C-470 ramps, especially on the weekends when trail use is highest. HEI Civil started construction on January 27, 2025. The completion date of the project is anticipated to be on or before December 31, 2025.

In order to build the new pedestrian bridge, crews have built a <u>pedestrian detour</u>. Cyclists will be required to dismount and walk through the area. Cyclists and pedestrians should slow down and follow signage through the area. This detour will remain in place throughout the project.

• 2025 Pavement Management Projects

- The 2025 Pavement Management projects under contract currently total \$17,518,074.22 with \$11,473,696.44 spent; work is 65% complete.
- The **2025 Sidewalk Repair Project** has been awarded a contract amount of \$2,635,150.00. Additional work has been added to the contract, and the current amount is \$4,141,104.92. The sidewalk project is 83% complete, based on funding. A change order in the amount of \$633,454.92 was approved by the Board on September 2nd. Concrete repair work will continue the week of September 15th with pavement repairs throughout Highlands Ranch.
- The 2025 Asphalt Overlay Project has been awarded with a contract amount of \$11,011,969.30. An additional \$2,365,000 has been added through change orders and the current amount is \$13,376,969.30. Construction began on June 2, and the project is 60% complete based on funding. Work continues in Parker East and E. Palmer Divide Road.

Ideal Fencing will continue guardrail installation and repair this fall. Repairs will be performed on Rainbow Creek Road and on Lincoln Avenue at Stonegate Parkway. A new guardrail will be installed on Russellville Rd. near Red Deer Rd.



• 2023 Spring Canyon LID – The design consultant, TST, is working on design work and 25% plans are



anticipated soon. The geotechnical design report has been reviewed and is being incorporated into the design. TST has begun the CDPHE approval process for the proposed lift station. The project is on track for mid-2026 construction bidding. The county has received rough construction cost estimates as well as a proposal for final design work. (Design work performed in advance of finalizing financing will be reimbursed to the County by the lender as part of the construction loan.)

• 2023 Bannock LID - The design consultant, TST, is working on the design, with a preliminary design expected



by the end of the year. County staff have reviewed the initial roadway design and provided feedback. The consultant is continuing the roadway design and beginning the drainage design. Once the preliminary design is complete, financing will be executed, and plans will be prepared for bidding. (Design work performed in advance of finalizing financing will be reimbursed to the County by the lender as part of the construction loan.)

 - Canyons South Filing 1: A Sight Draft is being executed to draw on the LOC (\$1,863,694.43) for All Phases Warranty DV2018-209. An agenda has also been prepared to go before the BOCC on October 14, 2025. If the amendment to extend the expiration date is received prior to the expiration date, no action will be taken.

Operations and Pavement Management

- Roadside Mowing The map shows all mowing activities planned for this year. Scheduled mowing is
 highlighted in light green and completed mowing is highlighted in dark green. An estimated 155 road miles
 have been mowed so far in the Fall Season.
- **Street Sweeping Program:** In September, 135 lane miles were swept and 60 square yards of debris were removed from County roadways.
- Gravel Road Blading: In September, 318 lane miles were graded for a total YTD of lane 2,062miles.
- Paved Surface Maintenance: In September, 8,100 pounds of pothole patching material was applied to County roads for a YTD total of 189,484 pounds of cold mix. During the same month, 7,440 pounds of crack sealing material was used for a YTD total of 161,310 pounds of cold mix.
- **Culvert Inspections** During this reporting period, 64 culvert inspections were completed on 14 county roads. Condition reports from 714 total inspections (YTD):

Traffic

• Douglas County Traffic Division contracted with RoadSafe to complete our annual pavement marking maintenance project, focusing on S University Blvd at locations that were postponed over the past several years while concrete roadway projects were being completed. This project encompassed the replacement of approximately 2,730 square feet of inlay 120 mil preformed beaded thermoplastic pavement markings with anti-slip material. Double All existing long lines on S University Blvd (approximately 45,242 square feet) were removed and replaced with more durable epoxy material and higher quality glass beads.

travel lanes (shown on the left) show the before picture, use of water-based traffic paint, while the westbound travel lanes (shown on the right) show the after picture, use of the more durable marking. This durable marking and higher quality retroreflective beads will significantly improve the safety of the motoring public and county crews. With a longer-lasting marking, our crews will not be exposed to the traffic hazard of restriping as quickly. Skip lines were installed in durable 3M contrast tape to

Pedestrian Safety Improvements at the Diamond K Trail Crossing on S. Ranch Road - Residents along S.



Ranch Road contacted the Traffic Division to request increased pedestrian safety at the Diamond K Trail crossing. In response, Traffic Engineering conducted an engineering study that revealed more than 200 pedestrians cross S. Ranch Road each day. In September, Traffic Services installed rectangular rapid-flashing beacons (RRFB) on S. Ranch Road at the

Diamond K Trail crossing. This installation marked the culmination of several improvements on S. Ranch Road, including the replacement of crosswalk markings, the posting of a 30 MPH speed limit, and the deployment of radar speed feedback signs.

Operational Improvements at Waterton Road and Rampart Range Road: Traffic Services completed



modifications to pavement markings on the eastbound Waterton Road approach to Rampart Range Road. This work included removing existing pavement markings and installing new channelizing markings to extend the right-turn lane. The changes will allow vehicles on Waterton Road to access the right-turn lane from 430 feet upstream

of the traffic signal at Rampart Range Road. The expected benefits are a decrease in right-turning vehicles queuing in the through lane, more efficient traffic flow, and fewer lane changes at the intersection.

• Radar Speed Feedback Sign Deployments: Traffic Systems is continuing seasonal deployment of radar speed feedback signs. The Traffic Division rotates 10 signs at locations requested by residents and four large signs along major roadways for two-week intervals. Their primary function is to display an approaching driver's speed, provide an alert to drivers exceeding the speed limit, and record speed and volume data for each vehicle that passes by. Traffic engineers utilize the collected data to address and respond to resident concerns. When excessive speeding is identified, the location may be forwarded to the Douglas County Sheriff's Office Traffic Unit for targeted enforcement.



Successes/Highlights

- The Colorado Apprenticeship Hub, under the direction of the Arapahoe/Douglas Workforce Development Board, announces \$3 million in grant funding through the Colorado Apprenticeship Incentive Grant. This funding supports the development and expansion of Registered Apprenticeship Programs and high-quality pre-apprenticeship programs across Colorado. Approximately 20–30 grants will be awarded through a competitive process, with individual awards up to \$150,000.
- The **Employment First Program** started a new program year on October 1st. The team will be closely monitoring the impacts of the work requirement changes for able-bodied adults without dependents.
- A/D Works! hired its 2nd instructor for the AELA/GED program. This program started enrolling participants on 10/7 for digital literacy and will expand to begin providing GED services in October.
- A/D Works! hired a Homeless Veteran Reintegration Program Workforce Specialist. He starts on 10/13.

• State Strategic Growth Legislation – Required Reporting Consideration Follow Up – This is a follow up to the August 12 work session to provide the reports required for HB24-1153, Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) and HB24-1313, Housing in Transit-Oriented Communities (TOC). In addition, the Board requested an assessment of general compliance with the Legislation was requested and an overview was provided. Staff

- was directed to submit the reports, and staff will work with the Housing Partnership to complete a Housing Action Plan to identify gaps in units required under the current legislation by the January 2028 deadline.
- Event Center Regulatory Amendment Request A request has been made by Cherry Valley Community Action group to consider changes to the Event Center regulations on A-1 zoned parcels and proposed regulatory changes in minimum parcel size from 35 acres to 80 acres, limit setback discretion of the Board, and increasing highway setbacks. Historic Preservation & Douglas County Library Exhibit Partnership — Staff briefed the Board on a
partnership with Douglas County Libraries (DCL) to develop three exhibits at the Castle Rock, Highlands
Ranch and Parker branches. The development plan was presented and would result in an estimated
\$95,000 financial investment from the County in addition to investments from DCL for interpretive signage,
purchase of exhibit cases and dedicated space in facilities. Staff will draft and execute a Memorandum of

Support for the funding has come primarily from numerous community members because of the lack sports fields, in addition to the potential loss of fields located at the Fairgrounds property as the Fairgrounds Master Plan progresses. Lighting the fields is expected to add approximately 3 hours of usable field time on weekdays as well as expanded weekend availability. The School District stated that no future requests for lighting other high school fields would be made and they assume all ongoing operational and maintenance costs, estimated at \$40,000 annually.
