Presentation: "Exploring CALF and Lowell Ranch"

- The Colorado Agricultural Leadership Foundation (CALF) is dedicated to connecting all people to agriculture through educational programs, community projects, leadership development and volunteer opportunities.

- Educational programs include field trips incorporating hands-on experiences in alignment with state and local academic standards, a vibrant beekeeping community and Camp CALF.
- Camp CALF, a summertime program, is open to kids entering 3rd through 7th grade, with a companion leadership program for 8th graders.
- Lowell Ranch was originally homesteaded in 1878.
- Henry and Maude Lowell came to the ranch in 1906 and members of the family have occupied and owned the ranch since then.
- John Lowell was born on the ranch and followed the family tradition of cattle ranching. Later on, he also started raising and showing sheep.
- John and his wife Bea were strong supporters of 4-H and other youth activities.
- In 2002, they created CALF to promote agricultural education and community involvement.
- In 2010, the Douglas County Board of Commissioners designated the Lowell Ranch as a historic landmark.
- More volunteers are welcome to join the CALF family.
