I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Highlands Ranch Community Association (HRCA) is requesting funding from the Parks, Trails, Historic Resources and Open Space (PTHROS) sales tax in the amount of \$3,500,000 to construct a passive trail network with a trailhead on approximately 350 acres in an area known as Wildcat Regional Park and the Highlands Ranch Open Space Conservation Area (OSCA). The trail network will consist of approximately 10 miles of new trails that will connect with the Douglas County East West trail. Funding will be allocated from Trails and Open Space Account of the PTHROS sales tax. The current account balance of the Trails and Open Space Account is approximately \$24,300,000.

II. REQUEST

Approval of a PTHROS Funding Agreement between Douglas County and the HRCA in the amount of \$3,500,000.

III. BACKGROUND

HRCA is a nonprofit homeowners association incorporated in 1981 to serve the planned community of Highlands Ranch. HRCA manages covenant enforcement, architectural review, and community services, while also operating four recreation centers, maintaining the 8,200-acre Backcountry Wilderness Area (AKA OSCA), and hosting a wide range of community events. Governed by an elected Board, district delegates, and volunteer committees, HRCA serves more than 30,000 households.

Wildcat Regional Park was dedicated to Douglas County as part of the parks land dedication process within the Highlands Ranch Planned Development (HRPD). Per the HRPD, the

property can be used as a regional park or open space. The County has considered the development of this property as a park on multiple occasions, but neighbors have opposed the development of this property as an active park. The HRCA Board of Directors have undergone a community input process and proposes utilizing the property for passive recreation and open space uses verses developing the property as an active park.

The Trails and Open Space Account of the PTHROS sales and use tax allows trails to be funded that are located on County open space, for regional trail systems, or trails that connect County open space properties. This request will connect the proposed trail network with the County's East West trail and will be open for all public use as a passive open space.

HRCA will seek all approvals necessary and will oversee the construction of the trail network. HRCA will work with County staff, as necessary, to ensure the project is completed within three (3) years from the date of approval. Once constructed, HRCA will maintain the property and all improvements within this area.

HRCA has presented the project to the County's Open Space Advisory Committee (COSAC) on several occasions. COSAC recommended funding the project on April 22, 2025, with the condition that County staff work with HRCA to reduce any unnecessary costs and to maximize the sales tax funding. HRCA staff worked with County staff on issues such as access, trailheads, trails, and amended the proposal based on that work. HRCA presented the plan that is attached to this funding request to COSAC on September 7, 2025. COSAC members updated scorecards for the Board's review at the October 2, 2025 meeting.

IV. ADVISORY BOARD RECOMMENDATIONS

COSAC unanimously recommends funding the \$3,500,000 project from the Trails and Open Space Account. COSAC requests that HRCA place a conservation easement on the property to ensure that the property is only used for passive uses in perpetuity. COSAC also suggests that the project includes signage that identifies that the trail network is open to all members of the public and funded by Douglas County.

V. STAFF ASSESSMENT

The Board of County Commissioners may approve the PTHROS Funding Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with HRCA in the amount of \$3,500,000.

PROJECT SUMMARY AND REQUEST FOR FUNDING

Greetings, Mr. Dertz, DougCo COSAC, and the DougCo Board of County Commissioners:

The Highlands Ranch Community Association ("HRCA") is pleased to present our funding request proposal for the Wildcat Regional Park.

As you know, the Wildcat Regional Park property is a valuable natural asset located in southeastern Highlands Ranch. Our proposal is to develop the Wildcat Regional Park property with an emphasis on passive recreation, conservation, and wildlife preservation in this beautiful open space and wilderness area, which will benefit the community and preserve the environment.

Our proposal includes the construction of five miles of pedestrian trails that will accommodate all, with benches to relax and enjoy the surrounding open space. Also included is a family picnic area and shade structure. This five-mile trail will provide additional connectivity of the existing Douglas County east/west trail network to neighboring communities like Lone Tree, Castle Pines North, South Suburban, Parker, and Sterling Ranch/Chatfield, making it a true regional treasure.

Also included is the construction of five miles of directional single-track mountain bike trails and a bike skills area on property currently owned by HRCA.

The mountain bike trails will be located on the east and west side of Grigs Road, each approximately two-and-a-half to three miles in length and will include natural features like berms, humps, rock/wood features (no large arial jumps are planned). These trails will have direct access to the Douglas County East-West Trail and both the proposed Wildcat Regional Park parking area as well as the Grigs Road Pavilion parking area.

The bike skills area, located on the east side of Grigs Road and occupying approximately three to four-acres, will include a playground for riders of all ages and skill levels. The amenities will include pump tracks, flow lines, skinnies, logs, berms, and more.

All these amenities, including those on property currently owned by the HRCA, will be open to all Douglas County residents.



As you can see from our current conceptual plan (reference Exhibit B, attached), our proposal is centered on preserving the natural beauty of the Wildcat property and protecting wildlife habitats. By dedicating the park to wildlife preservation, passive recreation opportunities are realized. Our proposal emphasizes conservation, safeguarding the existing ecosystems, including the significant elk population in the area. This approach aligns with community values about the importance of maintaining open spaces while introducing a passive recreational system that future generations can enjoy.

We are respectfully requesting funding from the Parks, Trails, Historic Resources, and Open Space (PTHROS) Sales and Use Tax in the amount of \$3,500,000.00 to construct Wildcat Regional Park's amenities, as described above (reference Exhibit A, attached).

Our intention is to internally fund all future maintenance requirements once the trail network is complete.

We greatly appreciate your consideration of this request. HRCA looks forward to working with Douglas County to ensure that Wildcat Regional Park becomes a lasting community resource—enhancing recreation, conservation, and connectivity for all residents.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN DOUGLAS COUNTY AND HIGHLANDS RANCH COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (the "Agreement") is made and entered into this ____ day of ______, 2025, by and between the BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF DOUGLAS, STATE OF COLORADO (the "BOCC"), and HIGHLANDS RANCH COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION, INC., authorized to do business in Colorado ("HRCA"). The BOCC and the HRCA are hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Parties" and individually as a "Party".

RECITALS

WHEREAS, in 2022, the Douglas County voters approved a referred tax measure allocating funding for local parks, trails, historic resources, and open space with the discretion to make some of that funding available to local partners to fund partnership projects as recommended by citizen advisory committees ("Sales and Use Tax"); and

WHEREAS, on September 7, 2025, the County Open Space Advisory Council (COSAC) heard HRCA's plans to construct a passive trail network on a 202-acre property known as Wildcat Regional Park that will link the Highlands Ranch Community to the Douglas County East West Regional Trail and be available to the general public (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, HRCA has requested funding from the Parks, Trails, Historic Resources, and Open Space (PTHROS) Sales and Use Tax in the amount of \$3,500,000.00 to construct approximately ten (10) miles of trails, a trailhead, and accessory structures; and

WHEREAS, HRCA has proposed to fund all future maintenance requirements once the trail network is complete; and

WHEREAS, on October 2, 2025, COSAC provided a recommendation to the BOCC to fund the Wildcat Regional Park with funds from the PTHROS Sales and Use Tax, Trails and Open Space Account; and

- **NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration of the Parties' mutual covenants contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereto agree as follows:
- 1. Amount of Funding. The BOCC hereby awards to HRCA a sum not to exceed **THREE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS AND ZERO CENTS (\$3,500,000.00)** (the "Funding Award") for use by the HRCA solely to complete the Project, in substantial conformity with Exhibit A. Subject to the BOCC's determination in its sole discretion that the HRCA is in compliance with this Agreement, the BOCC shall disburse the Funding Award in one payment and in accordance with the terms outlined in this Agreement.

In no event shall the BOCC be liable for payment under this Agreement for any amount in excess of **three million five-hundred hundred thousand dollars and zero cents (\$3,500,000.00)**. The BOCC is not under obligation to make any future apportionment or allocation to this Agreement nor is anything set forth herein a limitation of liability for HRCA potential expenditure for this Agreement outside the current fiscal year is subject to future annual appropriation of funds for any such proposed expenditure.

- 2. <u>Use of Funds.</u> The Funding Award shall be used for eligible expenses of the HRCA as descried in Exhibit A and three years from the date of executing this Agreement or October 14, 2028, whichever is later.
- 3. <u>Distribution of Funds.</u> The full amount of the Funding Award (\$3,500,000.00) will be disbursed to HRCA in a one-time lump sum payment upon execution of this Agreement.
- 4. <u>Term.</u> It is mutually agreed by the Parties that the term of this Agreement shall commence upon execution by the Parties until terminated.
- 5. <u>Project Scope.</u> HRCA shall not materially modify the Project without the prior written approval of the BOCC. Any material modification to the Project undertaken without the BOCC's prior written consent may be deemed a breach of this Agreement, entitling the BOCC to all remedies available under this Agreement.
- 6. <u>Authorized Representative.</u> Dan Dertz, Director of Open Space & Natural Resources is designated as Authorized Representative of the BOCC regarding Open Space funds (the "Authorized Representative") for the purpose of administering, coordinating, and approving the work performed by HRCA under this Agreement.
- 7. Compliance with All Laws and Regulations. HRCA hereby assumes responsibility for compliance with all regulatory requirements in all applicable areas, including, but not limited to, nondiscrimination, worker safety, local labor preferences, preferred vendor programs, equal employment opportunity, use of competitive bidding, and other similar requirements. In addition, HRCA applicable ordinances, regulations, and resolutions of Douglas County and all necessary licensing and permitting requirements imposed by an agency of a local, state or federal government.
- 8. <u>Indemnification</u>. The BOCC cannot and by this Agreement does not agree to indemnify, hold harmless, exonerate or assume the defense of HRCA or any other person or entity whatsoever, for any purpose whatsoever. The HRCA shall, to the extent permitted by law, defend, indemnify and hold harmless the BOCC, its commissioners, officials, officers, directors, agents, and employees from any and all claims, demands, suits, actions or proceedings of any kind or nature whatsoever, including workers' compensation claims, in any way resulting from or arising from this Agreement; provided, however, that HRCA need not indemnify or save harmless the BOCC, its officers, agents and employees from damages resulting from the sole negligence of the BOCC commissioners, officials, officers, directors, agents and employees.

- 9. <u>Independent Contractor.</u> HRCA is an independent contractor. Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement, all personnel and volunteers of the HRCA shall be and remain at all times, employees or volunteers of the HRCA for all purposes. It is not intended nor shall it be construed that the HRCA, its employees or volunteers are agents, employees or officers of Douglas County for any purpose whatsoever.
- 10. <u>Audits and Accounting.</u> HRCA shall maintain standard financial accounts, documents, and records relating to the use, management, and the operation of the Project. HRCA shall maintain standard financial accounts, documents, and records relating to the use, management, and operation of the Project. The BOCC shall have the right, upon reasonable notice to HRCA, to audit the books and records of HRCA which pertain to the Project and to the use and disposition of the BOCC funds. The BOCC shall retain the authority to audit for two years after Project completion.
- 11. <u>Inspection.</u> The BOCC shall have the right to inspect the Project area to ascertain compliance with this Agreement during business hours at any time during the Project and up to six months after termination or completion of the Project.
- 12. <u>Termination for Convenience</u>. The BOCC may terminate this Agreement at any time and for any reason at its sole discretion by providing HRCA written notice of such termination at least thirty (30) calendar days prior to the effective date of such termination. Upon such termination, HRCA shall be entitled to compensation for activities performed in accordance with this Agreement which were incurred prior to the effective date of the termination, but not exceeding the available budget balance at the time of the effective date of the termination.
- 13. <u>Effect of Project Completion or Termination</u>. HRCA agrees that Project completion or termination of this Agreement does not invalidate continuing obligations imposed on HRCA by this Agreement. Project completion or termination of this Agreement does not alter the BOCC's authority to disallow costs and recover funds based on a later audit or other review and does not alter the HRCA's obligation to return any funds due to the BOCC as a result of later refunds, corrections, or other transactions.
- 14. <u>Notices.</u> Notices concerning termination, alleged or actual violations of the terms or provisions of this Agreement, and all other notices shall be made as follows:

- 15. <u>Assignment.</u> HRCA covenants and agrees that it will not assign or transfer its rights hereunder, or subcontract any work hereunder, either in whole or in part without the prior written approval of the Authorized Representative. Any attempt by the HRCA to assign or transfer its rights hereunder shall, at the option of the Authorized Representative, void the assignment or automatically terminate this Contract and all rights of the HRCA hereunder.
- 16. <u>Applicable Law and Venue.</u> This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Colorado and venue for any dispute hereunder shall lie exclusively in the County of Douglas, State of Colorado.
- 17. <u>Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits.</u> The recitals set forth above and Exhibit A attached hereto are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 18. <u>Severability.</u> If any provision of this Agreement, or the application thereof, is found to be invalid, the remainder of the provisions of this Agreement, or the application of such provision other than those as to which it is found to be invalid, shall remain in full force and effect.
- 19. <u>Third-Party Beneficiary</u>. The Parties hereby acknowledge and agree that this Agreement is intended only to cover the relative rights and obligations between the Parties, and that no third-party beneficiaries are intended.
- 20. No Waiver of Governmental Immunity Act. The Parties agree that their commissioners, officials, officers, directors, agents and employees, are relying on, and do not waive or intend to waive by any provisions of this Agreement, the monetary limitations or any other rights, immunities and protections provided by the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, §§ 24-10-101 to 120, C.R.S., or any other immunities or defenses from liability otherwise available to the Parties.
- 21. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding and agreement of the Parties and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations, or agreements, either written or oral related to the subject matter of this Agreement.
