







- **HEART Success Story** A Heart Navigator has been working with a woman who was facing immense hardship with severe disabilities while experiencing homelessness, often residing in her vehicle. Despite the overwhelming challenges, her story is one of hope, resilience, and the remarkable impact of community support. The woman endured the difficulties of life on the streets while coping with complex physical and mental health issues that made daily survival increasingly challenging. Through the collaborative efforts of multiple non-profit organizations and faith-based partners, she was ultimately able to transition into permanent housing at an Assisted Living Facility here in Colorado. In addition, a local church consistently provided meals for both her and her service animal, with support from a broader network of non-profit organizations. The coordinated efforts of these compassionate groups changed the trajectory of her life. Today, she resides in a safe and supportive home where she receives the care and dignity she deserves.
- Faith-Based Roundtable On May 15, Douglas County hosted a Faith-Based Roundtable meeting at Sunday



Salmon, led by Commissioner Laydon and attended by 35 representatives from local faith communities. Attendees gathered to share and collaborate on outreach projects their congregations are currently engaged in. The meeting also provided an opportunity to learn more about Tessa, the new operator of the Douglas County Domestic Violence Safehouse, and the services they will offer to survivors of domestic violence

and sex trafficking. Tessa staff shared their mission and approach and provided details on the variety of services offered through their organization. A key focus of the discussion was exploring ways faith-based organizations can support Tessa's work and collaborate to serve those experiencing domestic violence. The event fostered meaningful dialogue and strengthened connections between service providers and the faith community.

Manna Resource Center Spring Graduation - On May 13, staff attended the Manna Resource Center (MRC)



graduation to celebrate the 12 participants graduating from their self-sufficiency program. The vision of MRC is to see cycles broken, families strengthened and live transformed. To help participants achieve this the MRC program offers a Parent Connect course, individualized coaching, and a financial independence course among other supportive services. The 12 graduates of the program collectively accomplished 84% of the goals they set to achieve and increased their self-sufficiency score by 24%. Overall, in 2004 MRC celebrated their 100th MRC graduate and collectively their graduates to date earn an annual income of over

\$4.5M and this represents an increase of 296%.

Office of Emergency Management

- Staff delivered a Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) Tabletop Exercise for elected officials and department directors. Based on input from that exercise several PSPS plans and operational tools are in final phases of development.
- Staff are preparing kickoff meetings for the County Hazard Mitigation Plan update.
- Staff are closely monitoring imminent changes to FEMA's organizational structure, financial processes, grant and training programs, and disaster thresholds.
- The County's contract helicopter arrived back in Douglas County on May 17. Douglas
 County Helitack is currently undergoing intensive critical training and is ready to
 provide aerial fire suppression support seven days a week until October 31st.

Be a Part of the Village It Takes - In collaboration with Arapahoe and Jefferson Counties, Douglas County is




proud to be part of the Collaborative Foster Care Program (CFCP), united under the shared slogan "Be a part of the village it takes." As part of our joint recruitment efforts, each county dedicated a day in May, Foster Parent Appreciation Month, to raise awareness and seek new foster homes.

On May 6, our Human Services team represented Douglas County with energy and dedication, spending the day canvassing local businesses across the county despite the cold and rainy weather. Staff asked local business owners to display flyers featuring a QR code that links to the CFCP website, where community members can explore opportunities to get involved—whether through volunteering, fundraising, or becoming a foster parent. Supporting youth in Douglas County goes far beyond

opening your home. Anyone can make a difference- whether it's through time, resources, or simply spreading awareness. It truly takes a village, and every role matters. We are deeply grateful for our Human Services staff and their unwavering dedication to this important cause. Their efforts continue to create meaningful connections and brighter futures for children in our community.

All Babies Cry Campaign - We noticed a significant increase in serious bodily injury to infants in the fall of



2022 that continued into 2023. Because of this drastic shift, we initiated a project looking into demographics and risk factors that were present in these families. We found that families without the common risk factors (substance use, mental health, domestic violence, criminal history, financial stress) showed a pattern of unhealthy communication between caregivers. This specific group of families made up approximately half of the serious bodily injury assessments we reviewed. Because our initial goal was prevention work, we developed the prevention campaign "All Babies Cry." Our goal is to encourage caregivers to learn about nervous system regulation and plan for effective communication in order to prevent episodes of abuse to infants. All Babies Cry has been included in the Douglas County Healthy Families Partnership swag bag that is given to every family who delivers an infant in one of the four participating hospitals. We are currently gathering feedback

on the effectiveness of the campaign and are excited to continue expanding it in the future. Program staff have also been selected to present this work at a national conference later this year!

Public Works

Activity Report May 11 – May 23

Active Projects (Cone Zone Webpage)

East Parker Road Median Project and **Resurfacing** - This Project starts the week of May 27, 2025. In the first phase of this project, Douglas County will install traffic safety medians on the south side of East Parker Road at Miller Road. This work will be performed by the County's concrete repair contractor, Chatos Concrete Concrete. work should take approximately 1 week.



County Line Road from Quebec Street to Chester Street Paving Project (City of Centennial Project) - The



City of Centennial, in partnership with the City of Lone Tree and Douglas County, is resurfacing County Line Road between Quebec St. and Chester St. The project will utilize a high-performance asphalt to extend the life of the new surface. The first phase will consist of rotomilling to remove the asphalt's top layer, placing the new asphalt overlay, and installing the final pavement striping. Access to adjacent roads and business access will be available during construction, with occasional short delays.

Palmer Divide Avenue Paving Project – Construction started May 5, 2025. A full road closure is in place for the duration of the project, which is anticipate to be completed on July 1, 2025. This project consists of extending the existing E. Palmer Divide Avenue asphalt pavement from approximately 660' west of Phoebe Grove to approximately 230' east of S. East Cherry Creek Road. This section of the roadway is currently paved in gravel. This project will also include drainage improvements by replacing five existing culvert crossings with new reinforced concrete pipe and flared end sections.



Kendrick Castillo Way / Plum Valley Lane Intersection Signal Project — This project consists of installing a



new traffic signal and making upgrades to meet current ADA requirements at the intersection of Kendrick Castillo Way and Plum Valley Lane. Traffic signal and roadway construction started on May 5, 2025, and traffic control will be in place until early September 2025. Traffic will be reduced to one lane in both north and southbound directions of Kendrick Castillo Way. Traffic

control (which includes signage) will start at C-470 and go north to end at County Line Road.

Hess Road over Access Road Bridge Rehabilitation Project - Construction started on April 14, 2025. Project

duration was anticipated to be 90 days, but is ahead of schedule and will now be completed on May 23. This Project consists of rehabilitating approximately 258 feet of a bridge structure and roadway crossing an access road. The project includes removal of portions of the present structure, asphalt milling, joint sealant, expansion device installation, waterproofing membrane, hot mix asphalt placement, concrete patching, erosion control, traffic control as well as other items.



- US 85 Widening from Highlands Ranch Parkway to C-470 The US 85 Widening Project is in its final phases of construction and is expected to be completed later this year. Yet, as crews work to safely finish construction, there are significant delays you should plan for in May, including delays up to 20 minutes. Through May, paving of the final layer of asphalt along 2.5 miles of US 85 (Santa Fe) will occur between Highlands Ranch Parkway and north of County Line Road, including the new C-470 bridge and on- and offramps.
- <u>Hilltop Road (Legend High School to Crest View Drive) Improvements Project</u> For segment 1 of this project,



the construction began on April 16, 2025 and the contractor began implementing public notifications on message boards. This is the first of three projects planned over the next few years to reconstruct and widen the Hilltop Road and Singing Hills Road corridors. The project has a 16-month completion date and is anticipated to be finished by September 2026. Phase 2 of Construction is anticipated to begin in 2027; and will take 9 to 12 months to

construct. Phase 3 of construction is anticipated to begin in 2029 (pending funding); and will take 12 to 18 months to construct.

• <u>C-470 Trail and University Blvd Pedestrian Grade Separation Project</u> - Douglas County and CDOT are



partnering on advancing the construction of a new bridge to improve pedestrian and cyclist safety by eliminating the need for users of the C-470 Trail to cross University Blvd at-grade. This currently requires four separate roadway crossings, across a total of eight lanes of traffic. The proposed grade separated C-470 Trail crossing will also improve traffic operations, since the numerous bicyclists and pedestrians currently crossing at-grade, adversely impact signal progression along University

Blvd and traffic entering or existing the C-470 ramps, especially on the weekends when trail use is highest. HEI Civil started construction on January 27, 2025. The completion date of the project is anticipated to be on or before December 31, 2025.

- 2025 Pavement Management Projects
 - The 2025 Sidewalk Repair Project's contract total YTD is \$15,844,619.30 and expenditures to date are \$2,017,953.05; work is 13% complete. An additional \$600,000 is scheduled to be added to the total amount under contract in a change order planned for approval at the June 10 BOCC Business Meeting.
 - The 2025 Asphalt Overlay Project has been awarded with a contract amount of \$11,011,969.30.
 Construction is currently scheduled to begin on June 2.
- Quebec and Lincoln Turn Lane (Post Office Corner) Muller Engineering
 is prepared a preliminary design and benefit analysis of the proposed
 turn lane. The traffic study was received on April 16 and is being
 reviewed. The concept design is expected mid-June.



- Quebec and Park Meadows Drive Intersection Improvements A kick-off meeting with Basis Partners is scheduled on May 29th, data collection and design will begin shortly afterward.
- I-25 Douglas County Monument Signs The selected design firm is working on identifying site locations. A
 design charette took place on May 21. Next steps will include reviewing the initial designs provided by the
 consultant with the BCC.

 <u>Grigs Road Paving Project - Douglas County</u> - The Grigs Road Phase 1 Project (Daniels Park Road to the Trailhead) is anticipated to start in July and end in the fall. Phase 1 will involve the extension of the existing asphalt pavement from Daniels Park Road to the East/West Regional Trailhead and Pavilion parking lot.

This section of Grigs Road has a gravel road surface and roadside ditches on both sides for drainage



purposes. The project will span one mile in length and will require significant earthwork, installation of new curb and gutter, and the construction of six-inch asphalt pavement. Additionally, drainage enhancements will be implemented throughout the installation of eight new inlet structures. The existing metal pipe culvert crossings will be replaced with upgraded reinforced concrete pipes and flared-

end sections.

- Highlands Ranch Pkwy Reconstruction, Broadway to Burntwood A study is underway to develop and evaluate possible changes to roadway cross section for the corridor between Broadway and Fairview. Olsson, Inc. has been selected for design and the contract is scheduled to go before the BCC on June 10, 2025. A project kick-off meeting was held on April 30th where the consultant provided a revised scope of work and fees. Once the preferred option is selected, design will begin on the first section of the corridor. The concrete in this section is in poor condition and reconstruction is planned for 2026, so that the project is complete prior to the Broadway / Highlands Ranch Pkwy safety improvement project planned for 2027.
- 2023 Spring Canyon LID Contract to begin preliminary design will be presented for approval on May 27, with design beginning soon after. Once preliminary design is complete (towards the end of 2025) plans will be prepared for bidding. Design work performed in advance of finalizing financing will be reimbursed to the County by the lender as part of the construction loan.



County Line Road Widening and Reconstruction (University to Broadway) <u>Douglas County</u> - This project will include a new traffic signal at the Clarkson
 Street / County Line Road intersection, a mill and overlay for the portion of the
 road within the City of Littleton located between Phillips Avenue and
 Broadway, as well as adding sidewalks. Construction is anticipated to start in
 early summer 2025.



2023 Bannock LID - The contract with TST for preliminary design will go before the Board on June 10th. Notice to proceed for design is June 12th. Once the preliminary design is complete (towards the end of 2025), financing will be executed, and plans will be prepared for bidding. (Design work performed in advance of finalizing funding will be reimbursed to the County by the lender as part of the construction loan.)

• Sterling Ranch Filing 7C; DV2024-410; 0225-0103-G - Sterling Ranch 7C is a 56-acre, 432-lot residential



development bisected by Roxborough Park Road in Littleton. Collaboration between Douglas County Engineering, Kimley-Horn, RE Monks, and Ensolum Consultants allowed for the design and implementation of a stormwater control plan that will increase construction efficiency, decrease installation and maintenance costs, and allow for durable, adequate control measures to co-exist with construction activity throughout development. Temporary Control measures utilized will be almost completely reusable and/or harvested from the existing site with virtually no material

being landfilled following construction, further reducing project costs by eliminating disposal fees.

- **Sterling Ranch Filing 7A; DV2023-410** Three Sons Construction is installing a water quality pond and access road (DV #2023-410).
- Pinery Filing 1 (King Soopers); DV2016-432 Fiore and Sons is installing inlets and storm structures (see below)







- Shea Helix Warehouse; DV2024-378 -Murry and Stafford are installing pipe and manholes (DV #2024-378) (see right).
- Lansing Meridian (Richmond Homes);
 DV2023-137 (see below and below right) Schmidt Paving LLC is milling and paving for Richmond Homes in Phase #2 (DV #2023-137).









Operations and Pavement Management

 Emergency repair on County Line Road: Emergency repairs were made on County Line Road between County Line Place and Quebec Street. The field adjacent to the road was eroded and washing out. Crews backfilled with topsoil, sloped the shoulder, and seeded and matted.



• Street Sweeping Program

- In May, 528 lane miles were swept and 153 square yards of debris was removed from County roadways.

Traffic

Radar Speed Feedback Sign Deployments - Traffic Systems has begun seasonal deployments of radar speed



feedback signs. The Traffic Division has 10 signs that are installed generally from May through October at locations requested by residents for two-week intervals. Their primary function is to display an approaching driver's speed and provide an alert to drivers exceeding the speed limit while recording speed and volume data for each vehicle that passes by. Traffic engineers utilize the collected data to address resident concerns. When

excessive speeding is identified, the location may be forwarded to the Douglas County Sheriff's Office Traffic Unit for targeted enforcement. Deployments completed between April 20 – May 19:

The Traffic Division is charged with administering and processing Special Event Permits in unincorporated



Douglas County for events that take place on or near county roadways that due to the activity type or number of participants attending the event may have an impact on our transportation system and increase traffic congestion. Applications are received year-round. However, the season for the majority of these permitted events starts in March and goes through the end of November. On average, we approve and issue roughly 25 permits a year, with the majority of the events returning from previous years. Additional details for Special Event Permits

• Cattle Branding at Sandstone - Each May the cows and their young calves are rounded up in pens at Sandstone Ranch to worked. They all get branded, ear-tagged, treated for flies, and vaccinated, while the young males become steers before being sent out to the beautiful, wide-open pastures of the Ranch. Hard-working wranglers and staff gather for a hearty meal when the work is done.



• Wildlife Crossings - Renee Callahan and Beth Pratt of Wildlife Crossings Across America and their team



toured the I-25 Gap wildlife complex on May 21st. Douglas County was their final leg on their fourth tour of America's wildlife crossings, logging 10,000 miles on the road! This leg included stops at the Plum Creek Bridge near Larkspur, the wildlife overpass under construction at Greenland Ranch, and the 'dogleg' wildlife underpass near County Line and Andrews Roads. Their team included Steve Winter, a National Geographic photographer who is known for

his work with snow leopards and his fiancée, Sharon Guynup, also a photographer and National Geographic writer. The photographer played by Sean Penn in the movie, *The Secret Life of Walter Mitty* is modeled after Mr. Winter. The team was exceedingly impressed with the complex of protected habitat, wildlife corridors, and highway crossings completed by Douglas County and its partners, including CDOT and CPW,

over the last 30 years. A lively debate arose over whether the Greenland overpass in Douglas County or the Wallis Annenberg overpass outside Los Angeles is the largest in North America, and possibly the world. The team filmed interviews of CDOT, CPW, and Douglas County personnel and took many photos for social media and an upcoming documentary. Historic Preservation

Museum Exhibit at Parker Water and Sanitation District - Douglas County is partnering with Parker Water
and Sanitation District (PWSD) to create a small museum exhibit in the lobby of their new headquarters
located by the Rueter-Hess Reservoir. The first phase of creating the museum exhibit was to move the

historic oil wagon from the Repository to PWSD headquarters. On May 16, Facilities and Parks staff assisted the Repository in moving the late 1800s oil wagon, requiring great care in protection of the wagon. Facilities staff moved the wagon with a forklift onto a flatbed truck then Parks staff built a wooden crate around the wagon to protect it during transit and transported it to PWSD. Later this summer the remainder of the museum space will be built out with three display cases showcasing Douglas County artifacts, a large wall timeline, and a large painted wall mural, all telling the history of Douglas County across time.









Parks, Trails and Building Grounds

Safety Promotion at Rueter-Hess - Rueter-Hess Reservoir opened for another season of paddleboarding, canoeing, and kayaking on May 2nd. Visitors are making the most of sunny days on the Reservoir. A Park Ranger greets visitors at the entrance to the Reservoir, completes watercraft and fishing tackle inspections, and if they are going to access the water, they are reminded to always to wear their lifejacket.

Promoting safety remains a top priority for the Park Rangers. During proactive boat patrols, they engage with recreating paddleboarders, kayakers, canoeists, and anglers. These proactive boat patrols position the Park Rangers to render aid during dangerous situations. So far this year, eight people have found themselves in situations where they have had to get assistance to make it safely back to the shore.

Completed IT Projects

- Asset Management for the Open Space Division Project In partnership with the Open Space division and vendor Cartegraph, IT has implemented a new asset management tool to streamline how assets are tracked and managed. This modern solution replaces outdated methods that relied on spreadsheets and Word documents, making it challenging to track work, expenses, and asset details accurately. With the new tool, staff can more effectively manage properties, trails, buildings, signs, and other key resources. It also improves maintenance scheduling, disaster preparedness, and overall operational planning by linking materials and equipment to digital work orders. The result is more accurate reporting and better data to support informed budgeting and decision-making.
- Motor Vehicle Data Warehouse Launched in May 2025, the Motor Vehicle Data Warehouse was
 developed by IT in partnership with the Office of the Clerk and Recorder to provide a centralized, easy-touse reporting tool. By integrating data from eight sources into visual dashboards, the system gives clear
 insights into office workloads and transactions. This supports more efficient operations by reducing wait
 times, improving transparency, enabling data-driven decisions, and helping allocate resources based on

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actual needs and trends. It establishes performance standards, enhances planning, and provides valuable metrics for internal and external stakeholders.

• Next Generation Teams – Coroner's Office - The Next Generation Teams and SharePoint implementation is now complete for the Coroner Department. Led by the IT team, this transition created a standardized Microsoft Teams collaboration space to improve communication and productivity. The project included migrating existing content, delivering hands-on training to support effective tool use, and retiring outdated systems to ensure staff work in a modern, streamlined environment. While initial feedback has been positive, the IT team will follow up in the coming months to gather input and reinforce utilization of the new collaboration space.
